Opening in Prayer

Spend a few minutes in prayer asking God to guide your time in His Word.

Personal Reflection/Group Discussion

Galatians was written by the apostle Paul to several early Christian communities in the province of Galatia, which is modern-day Turkey (see Acts 13-14). In this letter, Paul faces head on how these young Christians were being misled and missing out on the true freedom found only in the Good News of Jesus Christ.

Read Galatians 2:1-10.

- 1. Paul went to Jerusalem for at least two reasons. What were they?
- 2. What are several reasons church unity is so important? What can all members and leaders of a church do to grow in and maintain unity?
- 3. What was the issue Paul refused to give in about? What truth was Paul trying to preserve?
- 4. Who were the Gentiles, and why would Jews want them to follow the laws of the Old Testament?
- 5. Do you ever feel guilty or insecure in your relationship with God? What might this be telling you about how you view your acceptance with Him?
- 6. What distinction can be made between *believing the truth* and *living in* the truth? For further insight, see James 2:14-19 and 2 John 1:1-6.

- 7. Visit brookwoodchurch.org/about, and read through Our Beliefs and Who We Are. Do you agree with these beliefs and values? If so, what impact have these truths had on your life? What reservations or guestions do you have about what Brookwood believes?
- 8. How would you respond to someone who says, I'm a Christian. Jesus has forgiven all my sin – past, present and future. That means I can do whatever I want.
- 9. How would you explain the *Good News* of Jesus Christ to someone who doesn't believe in Jesus? How about to someone who thinks all religions lead to God and Christians shouldn't be so narrow-minded?
- 10. What steps could you take to grow in your ability to preserve the truth?
